

Director's Note

"Could we make a play that could give people a little balm of comfort, in the midst of something unfathomable, and make us all better able to face it?" - Justice Hehir, co-creator and writer of "the wish"

What most drew me to this play from the start was its acknowledgment of Amanda's fear.

Fear comes with being human. For women, fear can easily be ingrained in everyday situations and circumstances. And this fear only heightens when in pursuit of what is traditionally considered less female. Amanda wrestles with this fear in a system designed to work against her, where she sees no precedent for her presence.

What if the acknowledgment of that fear is what is necessary in order to move forward? If we know it's there, if we expect it, maybe it can hold less power. Maybe, like Kim, we can recognize it and work to lessen its presence for the next generation. My hope is that stories like this are a small seed planted towards this aim.


